Lesson Link: There are consequences to sins in our lives. God wants us to be in friendship with Him, even when we sin.

Questions:

- 3. Sister Stephanie said that sin always leaves a mark. Can you think of other stories where someone felt the consequence of their sin? What kind of mark did it leave? (Answers may include Adam and Eve or other stories the students have heard or read.)
