

The Empty Manger

Lesson Link: Jesus fulfills all God's promises to His people.

The Nativity was a foreshadowing of the Eucharist. Jesus' humble Birth reveals to us what His mission on earth will be—to give Himself to take away our sins and to give Himself to us in the Eucharist, out of love.

Questions:

- Why would Gabriel ask, "What good is all this praying?"
 (Answers may include because he was scared for his dad, he didn't see an answer right away, and he didn't see God doing anything.)
- 2. Have you or someone you know asked this question? (Answers may vary.)
- How did Mr. Norm answer Gabriel's question about praying? (Answers may include seeing that God answers all prayers in Jesus, it is good and makes a difference to pray, and all God's answers are from love even when they are not what we want.)
