"New Creations" in Baptism

Israel's crossing of the Red Sea prefigured God's amazing work in us at Baptism. In Baptism, we are united with Christ. In his Second Letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul says, "If any one is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, behold, the new has come" (5:17). God makes us "new creations" in Baptism.

This mystery of Baptism becomes clearer when we see how God's work in Baptism was prepared for by his work in the crossing of the Red Sea in Exodus and his work at Creation in Genesis.

Read the passages from the Creation account in Genesis 1 on the left. Then reread the passages from Exodus 14 on page 134 of the Student Text. Look for verses that use similar language to these passages in Genesis. Write the verses from Exodus in the second column.

The crossing of the Red Sea parallels God's work at Creation. God brings forth new life at Creation. God brings Israel to newness of life through the waters of the Red Sea. He saves them *from* death by destroying their enemies in the sea and frees them *for* a covenant relationship with him.

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God's work in Baptism is also similar to his work in the Red Sea.
